Joseph Key died on 20th September 1784, and is buried in St Nicholas' Churchyard, Nuneaton. He was an excise officer, but his relationship with the Church there is unknown, apart from the fact that he published four books of Psalms and Anthems for the use of country quires, the first in 1774, and the last two in 1785 and c. 1790, both posthumously by his wife, Elizabeth, who is also buried in the same churchyard.
